I attend the Budget Address every year. I also noted the following, which may be of value or interest to us.

Enhancing public safety and safer communities

The 2026-27 Budget protects communities across Saskatchewan by strengthening law enforcement capacity, supporting emergency response and improving community safety programs.

2026-27 Budget highlights:

- \$310 million to support RCMP operations in Saskatchewan, including \$26 million for First Nations policing, strengthening frontline policing capacity across urban, rural and northern communities.
- Nearly \$6 million to annualize the hiring of approximately 100 new municipal police officers across Saskatchewan.
- \$5 million to expand the Saskatchewan Marshals Service, supporting provincial priorities including gang enforcement, illegal weapons and drug trafficking.
- \$713,000 investment for the Saskatchewan Highway Patrol to support additional inspections and enhance highway safety.
- \$583,000 increase to the Municipal Police Grant program to help frontline officers respond to more calls for service.
- \$190,000 to introduce the Small Town and Rural Policing Grant program, to support proactive community policing in rural communities.

Quality of Life

- Doubling the Volunteer First Responders' Tax Credit from \$3,000 to \$6,000, recognizing the important contributions of volunteer firefighters, emergency medical responders and search-and-rescue teams.
- \$8 million in continued funding for programs that support local recreation and community services, including the Community Rink Affordability Grant, School Playground Equipment Program, and Veteran's Service Club Support Program.

Municipal Revenue Sharing and Community Infrastructure

- Nearly \$400 million in Municipal Revenue Sharing, an 8.5 per cent increase from last year, providing predictable funding for cities, towns, villages and rural municipalities.
- \$712 million in total direct provincial support to municipalities, an increase of \$47 million.
- \$239 million in infrastructure funding through programs administered by the Ministry of Government Relations, including federal-provincial infrastructure initiatives.
- \$20 million for the Rural Integrated Roads for Growth program, supporting improvements to rural municipal roads.
- \$38 million in policing grants, supporting initiatives such as Municipal Police Grants and the Small Town and Rural Policing Grant.
- Education property tax mill rates will remain unchanged for all property classes in 2026-27, helping maintain affordability for Saskatchewan residents.

Dear Mayor Jon Kroeker and Council:

Attached is your municipality's 2025 library fact sheet. Wheatland Regional Library had another successful year with increased usage of ebooks while keeping our physical circulation high. Through times of economic turbulence, libraries become more valuable to their communities as made evident by the almost 200,000 visits and 2,000 library programs offered across the region.

Every municipality has the opportunity to appoint a member to the Regional Library Board. The Regional Library Board meets twice a year, once in person in Saskatoon (April) and once on Zoom (October). For your convenience we have included the name of your appointed member and if they attended the meetings. Required representatives are strongly encouraged after every meeting to report back to the municipality and we hope you have had a chance to hear from your appointed representative.

On the fact sheet this year we have included libraries whereby your residents make up at least 10% of the usage. We have included a fact sheet for these libraries including the list of the 2025 local library board members. As the Public Libraries Act, 1996 states "*For the purpose of developing the local library in a municipality that participates in a regional library agreement, the councils of the municipalities whose residents use that local library shall appoint a local library board consisting of not less than five and not more than 15 members*"

Section 40 of the Public Libraries Act outlines the functions and responsibilities of the local library board. One of these responsibilities is:

(i) To consult with and report back on a regular basis to the council of the municipality with respect to which the local library board was created.

We hope you find this material informative and help you to understand the value you receive from the library for the levy paid on behalf of the people of your municipality. Even those residents who do not have a library in the community have access to the same materials as those who are lucky enough to enjoy a local library in the community.

We encourage you to stop in at your local library, talk to the staff and see the resources available to everyone. If you have any questions on the statistics or resources included in this package, please reach out.

1. 2026 Assessment Return:

Following the completion of the Assessment Appeal period, the Town of Dalmeny 2026 Assessment Return has been prepared and was sent to the Saskatchewan Assessment Management Agency (SAMA) on Friday, March 20, 2026.

2. Rural Municipality of Corman Park – Assessment Appeal Notice:

The Town's taxable assessment for the Lagoon property decreased from \$87,010 to \$86,900. However, starting in 2026, the Rural Municipality of Corman Park has implemented a \$120.00 fee per property in the rural municipality for firefighting fees paid by the Rural Municipality of Corman Park.

3. Code of Ethics Matter – Mayor Jon Kroeker:

Mayor Jon Kroeker requested the legal opinion of Kim Anderson of Robertson Stromberg regarding a matter involving the Town's Code of Ethics Bylaw. The total cost of the invoice regarding this matter is \$1,938.75, plus applicable taxes. As per Policy 2-2026 Council – Indemnification of Legal Fees, I recommend that this amount be paid at this time.

4. 2026 Revenue Sharing for the Town of Dalmeny:

On Wednesday, March 18, 2026, as part of the Government of Saskatchewan's 2026/2027 Budget Address, the Town of Dalmeny was advised that its revenue sharing amount will be increased for 2026. The amount will increase from the 2025 amount of \$532,928.00 to \$580,477.00, an increase of \$47,549.00.

5. Canada Community-Building Fund – First Installment:

On Friday, March 13, 2026, the Town received its first installment of the Canada Community-Building Fund in the amount of \$57,271.80. The second installment of \$57,271.80 should be received by the Town in August or September 2026.

6. Board Appointment and Board Resignation:

Jennifer Berg is interested in being appointed to the Dalmeny Library Board. As the Chief Administrative Officer, I would recommend her appointment.

Also, Ronda Farrow has decided to resign from the Dalmeny Library Board. As the Chief Administrative Officer, I would recommend that Council accept her resignation, with regret.

7. Upcoming Changes to Municipal Legislation:

Lawyer Curtis Clavelle of Robertson Stromberg has prepared a brief, as attached on "Upcoming Changes to Municipal Legislation". *The Municipalities Modernization and Red Tape Reduction Act* should take effect later this year.

UPCOMING CHANGES TO MUNICIPAL LEGISLATION

On November 26, 2025, the Saskatchewan Government introduced *The Municipalities Modernization and Red Tape Reduction Act* (the "Act"). This Bill amends *The Cities Act*, *The Municipalities Act*, and *The Northern Municipalities Act, 2010* for the following reported reasons:

1. Strengthen local governance;
2. Increase transparency for ratepayers; and
3. Reduce unnecessary regulatory burdens (red tape).

The Act was introduced in response to the Ministry of Government Relations' consultation with and local feedback from stakeholders and the public on *The Cities Act*, *The Municipalities Act*, and *The Northern Municipalities Act, 2010* in 2024.

AMENDMENTS

The proposed amendments at present in *The Municipalities Modernization and Red Tape Reduction Act* include:

1. Improving public access to municipal information by requiring municipalities to post meeting minutes, financial statements, and bylaws on a public website starting in 2027.
2. Supporting local governance by requiring municipalities to offer orientation training after each general election in order to better support council members in their roles. The training will cover roles and responsibilities, conflicts of interest, financial administration, and maintenance of a harassment-free workplace.
3. Additional amendments will also strengthen provisions related to harassment by making harassment of municipal employees an offence under the municipal Acts.
4. Red tape reductions including:
 - (a) Improving the fairness and efficiency of property assessment appeals through the following:
 - (i) The parties to an appeal will have more opportunities to enter into agreements to adjust the assessment; and
 - (ii) Appeal boards will have more flexibility to consolidate appeals so that similar ones can be heard at the same time.
 - (b) More efficient tools to address:
 - (i) Dangerous animals: council will be able to declare an animal dangerous instead of needing to obtain an order from a judge. Council will also be able to make an order requiring leashing/muzzling/fencing requirements, but only a judge may order that an animal be put down. However, a new bylaw is required for council to make these orders;
 - (ii) Illegal dumping: municipalities will now be able to fine vehicle owners for illegal dumping if the vehicle is identified, similar to parking violations;
 - (iii) Collecting tax arrears from delinquent oil and gas companies: it will be easier for municipal administrators to obtain information about oil and gas properties in arrears, serve notice to delinquent companies, and recover the taxes owed;
 - (iv) Allowing the municipality to issue an order to remedy with respect to bylaw contraventions occurring on Crown or municipal lands by the owner or occupant of adjacent land who caused the contravention.
 - (c) Replacing special service areas in rural municipalities with a simpler taxation tool.
 - (d) Removing duplicate forms for newly elected councillors and unnecessary reporting requirements to government.
 - (e) Potentially circumventing LAFOIPP requests for certain information, such as contracts entered by the municipality, accounts paid by the municipality, among other documents.

STATUS

The Act is expected to pass during the spring 2026 sitting of the Saskatchewan legislative assembly. Upon passage, the majority of the amendments would come into force immediately.

Once the Act is passed, it will require changes to current practices, new policies, etc. For example:

- (a) A new policy will have to be passed regarding how residents can request the documents circumventing LAFOIPP requirements as noted above.
- (b) A bylaw will be required if council would like to make dangerous dog declarations.
- (c) Training materials will need to be prepared for the mandatory training sessions following municipal elections.
